


The largest and longest-running Rotary project in Switzerland.

Because we finance apprenticeships and start-ups, thereby optimizing the integration o handicapped people in their communities.










Successes of Rotary's impact through mine-ex

CHF 23'412'500 Donations collected from 1996 to 2024



- CHF 12'000'000 for victims in Cambodia (rounded)
- CHF 8'000'000 for victims in Afghanistan (rounded)
- CHF 1'000'000 for education of orthopedic technicians
- CHF 120'000 for education for physio therapists
- CHF 34'000 for support of the women wheelchair basketball teams
- CHF 20'000 for a special project in demining with FSD (Fondation Suisse de Deminage)
- CHF 30'000 for tests of the find mine drone (Urs Endress foundation)
